Initially, the population approach was used, where interest lay in the way individual populations change and in the identification of factors affecting these changes. A good understanding of the dynamics of single populations is now emerging, but this has not been a very fruitful approach at the community level. In the natural world, few species can be treated as isolated populations, as most single species are the interacting parts of multispecies systems. The Health of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender People-Institute of Medicine 2011-06-24 At a time when lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender individuals—often referred to under the umbrella acronym LGBT—are becoming more visible in society and more socially acknowledged, clinicians and researchers are faced with incomplete information about their health status.
