All students enrolled in public high school in the state of Florida are required to take the PERT in the eleventh grade. The PERT tests students’ abilities in math, reading, and writing. The test directly tests for competence for intermediate algebra and freshman level composition. The PERT is not timed, and each section has thirty questions.
