There is now a flood of literature on the economics, politics and sociology of globalization, and regular commentary in the serious

daily and weekly press. Virtually all of this discussion makes the assumptions, and frequently explicit claims, about the novelty of globalization. According to one view, globalization is a new phenomenon that can be dated from the 1980s. A second view holds that globalization has a long history that can be traced to the nineteenth century, if not earlier. The importance of these themes scarcely needs elaborating. Yet they have still to attract significant attention from historians. This volume is the first by a team of historians (including C.A. Bayly, Richard Drayton, A.G.
